VICAR'S LETTER

The view from the study.

It was a tremendous pleasure to help lead our candidates through confirmation preparation, and a massive disappointment to miss the confirmation due to Covid! We started way back in November, delayed a week by the inconvenient occupation of our car park. Along the way we were disrupted briefly by Covid (with a couple of sessions having to go online) and at the time of the confirmation we were watching in horror as Russia pursued its invasion of Ukraine.

We now look ahead towards Easter, with the situation in Europe still in crisis as I write. In retrospect, one image during the confirmation course really stands out for me. We were watching a clip of a magnificent Easter vigil service in Moscow, with huge crowds making their way through the streets, culminating with the proclamation of the risen Christ as they flooded through the immense doors of an imposing Basilica. For a few seconds the face of Vladimir Putin was picked out from the congregation, smiling as he joined in the proclamation of the light of Christ shining in the darkness. How could someone share in such a declaration of the risen light of Christ, then later go on to bring such horrific darkness to Ukraine?

We may feel powerless in the face of such aggression and the profound suffering we have been witnessing, but we can be sure of one thing: aggression never brings about anything of lasting value. And surely this is why the way of Christ is the complete opposite of aggression. His is the way of sacrifice, of giving, of love. He uses powerlessness to disarm power, hope to overcome fear, peace to challenge hate, light to confront darkness.

As we come to celebrate Easter, let us with all sincerity join in the proclamation of the Resurrection – not only in our worship, but also in our lives. May we use our lack of power to stand up to aggression; may we become bearers of hope through the compassion we show to those suffering in Ukraine and elsewhere; may we stand firm in our faith in Christ, in the face of any fear; and may we be agents of peace wherever we find ourselves, bringing light into the darkness of the world. Tiny points of light may seem insignificant, but consider how far that light may travel, and how widely it might spread.

Look into the darkness of the empty tomb this Easter, and remember that Christ our light is risen, victorious over evil. Then remember also - we have received that light to share with the world.

My thanks go also to all those who assisted me during the course. With safeguarding requirements to be met, it was vital that other adults were present with me for the sessions, even online, and I was never without at least 2 or 3 others to support the course each week. At the risk of omitting someone, those to be thanked include: Debbie Carr, Sheena Cartmell, James Cowell, Nellie Cowell, James Eccleston, Sarah Jones, Debi Rusling, Matt Smith, Maureen & Laurence Wood, and Jayne Woollam.

The candidates represented 16 families from our community and comprised 18 children and 2 adults. The names of those confirmed are recorded in the 'parish registers' section, but I would also like to make reference to Harrison, who was a valued member of the group but was unable to be there for the service due to illness. I hope Harrison will be able to attend a confirmation service very soon.

Some of those confirmed have been part of the Church family at St Michael's for many years, others are linked mainly through the school. A large number were from our current Year 6 while others are already in High School. Regardless, they all worked well together and provided for some lively and unpredictable moments during the course! It was a privilege to be able to help lead all our candidates (children and adults) to the point where they were ready to affirm their commitment to follow Christ. The war in Ukraine: a faith view from Moscow.

The following message appeared in March on the website of the Diocese in Europe (part of the Church of England). The words are by Rev Canon Malcolm Rogers, Chaplain of St Andrew's Moscow.

St Andrew's Anglican Church in Moscow is situated only ten minutes' walk from the Kremlin, the physical and geographical centre of power. The Ministries of Education, Culture and Defence are near neighbours. We are in the centre of power and yet we are powerless. Today, as many of our dear friends have left Russia, and as we nervously wonder whether or when we should leave, we are even more conscious of our powerlessness.

Conflict was predicted and we were helpless, unable to do anything to prevent it. Now that 'special military operations', as they are called here, have begun, there is nothing that we can do to stop them. But it is precisely our powerlessness which means that there are things that we can do. We are gospel people, who serve a crucified but risen Lord. We are the 'nobodies' of 1 Corinthians 1, and it is our very powerlessness and insignificance and foolishness that can also be our strength, if it is handed to God.

First of all, we are simply here. We are a community of very messed up people, but as

we gather together to hear the Word of God and to receive bread and wine, a community of Russians and foreigners gathered together, centred on and receiving from Jesus Christ, our simple presence can be a witness of what the world can be like, of the future kingdom.

Secondly, in our powerlessness, we can worship and pray. We pray for peace. That is far more than just praying for the absence of war. We praise God for the coming Kingdom, for the hope he has given us. I am struck that in both Mary's song and Zechariah's song we praise God for what we hope will happen, as if it already has happened; and we cry out for God, as we pray and long for the coming of God's Kingdom. We pray for the time when there will be no more 'fake news', lies, betrayals or violence, and no more fear and death. And it is our very powerlessness which opens to us our dependence on God and on him doing wonderful works.

Thirdly, we can still speak truth. There are some things that we cannot say in Moscow, but we can still preach Jesus Christ crucified and risen and reigning. We can call people to repentance and offer people hope. In my 30 plus years of ministry, I have never known a time and a place when people are more hungering for God.

And fourthly we can love and serve our neighbour. We read the news and feel powerless. Most of us are in no position to solve world problems or to bring peace. The job advert when I applied to come to Moscow said that the person appointed could make a difference for world peace. On those grounds I have been a spectacular failure! But we can make a difference where we are, and love the actual physical neighbours who God has given us. For some, the neighbours are Ukrainian refugees. Yesterday, I heard from the woman who I ran our college Christian Union with. Since leaving university, she has been working with Polish Christians, witnessing, and serving mainly among addicts and street women. She wrote of how her team met a family of homeless Ukrainian refugees and they are now living in her flat.

There are many stories like that. Our neighbours at St Andrew's in Moscow are different. They are the young Russian crushed by what has been done in his name; the mother sick with anxiety for her son who has been sent to Ukraine, the foreign student unsure whether to leave or how to leave, the person who has been named on the wrong sort of list, the older person who fears a return to the isolation and economic depression of the 80s.

In our hubris we think that we are somebodies who can save the world - and we end up paralysed. But it is when we realise our powerlessness, that in the world's eyes we are 'nobodies', that we can begin to see the neighbour who God has given us and learn to serve them

Pray for us, for courage and wisdom and perseverance in faith and love. And we will pray for you.

It's all Greek to me! (cont)

Μηνιν άειδε, θεά, Πηληϊάδεω 'Αχιλήος ούλομένην, ή μυρί' 'Αχαιοίς άλγε' έθηκε,

Sing, Goddess, the wrath of Achilles Pelëides, The ruinous anger that woes on the Danaans brought Unnumber'd, and strong souls many of heroes sent To Hades, and made their bodies a prey for the dogs, A feast for the birds, while the purpose of Zeus was fulfill'd Ev'n from the hour when the two first parted in strife, Atrides, the King of men, and noble Achilles.

These are the first two of the 16000 lines of the Iliad, the epic poem by "Homer", of whom more in a later article. According to an essay on Homer by J Griffen, Balliol College, Oxford, the Iliad is "the first work of Western literature" which if true, makes these the first two lines in our literature. And gripping they are, as is the rest of the paragraph. I defy anyone not to be drawn into the story they foretell.

Let me try to explain the Greek lines. The first word transposed into English sound is Maynin, Anger. That is followed by a formulaic device whereby the poet invokes the Muse of Poetry, a sort of minor goddess (the third word Thea) to sing about the Anger. And "sing" incidentally is appropriate because poetry derived from song, and was delivered in this metred verse, of which more in a later article. Whose Anger? That of Achilles, son of Peleus, his name put at the end of the line, in place of equal emphasis with the Anger. And what of this anger? Was it just a childish pet? Well it may have started that way as we shall see, but it certainly did so not end up, because it was, first word of the second line, "Oulomenayn", which means, destructive. And it brought woes to the Achaians (or Danaans in the translation or Greeks as we know them), ie to Achilles' own side in the war against Troy! So just to spell it out again, the three vital words are all, brilliantly, put by the poet in place of strongest emphasis, at the first and last of line 1, and first place, line 2, followed by a pause. Thus it is that the theme that dominates the epic is thrust under our noses by the very first line.

On the first Sunday in Lent Neil spoke to us about anger; this particular anger led on to war, death and personal tragedy, not least to the angry man himself, Achilles. More to follow.

The confirmation candidates are willing to serve God. They took the decision to confirm their faith in Him.

On Thursday 3rd March, we celebrated the globally anticipated 'World Book Day'! Children and staff were invited to come dressed up as their favourite book character and it was fantastic to see how much effort everyone had put in to their costumes. The theme was 'You are a reader!' and so it was all about encouraging everyone to read for pleasure. All of the classes took part in lots of different reading-themed activities, including the teacher quiz, bookmark making, blindfold book-choosing and the BBC live lesson with special guests, award-winning author, Frank Cottrell-Boyce, and illustrator, Dapo Adeola. These were collected and transported to Poland for those *Cont on page 15* families who have had no choice but to flee their country. Mrs Coupe organised this on behalf of our school community.

We are very much looking forward to the next PTFA event which is the Easter Bingo- this event will take place on the 29th March at 6pm. We have been amazed with the support of all the local businesses that have donated prizes to support this event- thank you!

In the past few weeks our reception children enjoyed a local walk, our year 3 children had an informative visit to The Grimsargh Wetlands and visited the Science and Industry museum in Manchester, our year 6 children spent time with Reverend Neil at St Michael's Church learning about the Eucharist as well as enjoying a morning at Williamson Park, year 2 had a fantastic day at Brockholes Nature Reserve focusing on habitats and mini-beasts and year 5 have attended the Philharmonic Hall in Liverpool.

To support our parents/ carers in ensuring their child understands the need for safe internet access and appropriate use, we have organised a FREE Online Safety session which will be delivered by Lancashire Adult Learning via an online platform. This will take place on Monday 21st March, 4-5:30pm.

You will need: 2 Paper plates

Black paper Yellow paper 2 split pins

Scissors, glue, colouring pens and items to decorate the egg. How to do it:

- Cut out strips from the yellow paper for the rays of light and glue to a paper plate.
- Cut out a cross from the black paper and glue it over the light.
- Draw and decorate an Easter egg and glue it to the 2nd plate.
- Cut the plate down the middle.
- Use the split pins to attach the 2 halves to the first plate so that it slides open.
