VICAR'S LETTER

The view from the study.

We could have been anything we wanted to be, and it's not too late to change... So sang a stage full of year 6 and year 5 pupils at school for the finale of this summer's school production, Bugsy Malone. And didn't they sang it with enthusiasm!

I found myself thinking that this night would remain a very precious memory for those children, especially those in year 6 who would be moving on to high school after the summer. Many will have spent the last 7 years in the school family at St. Michael's, and alongside them on stage will have been some who will become lifelong friends. The school production will have brought them even closer together as they learned their lines, practised their dances and enjoyed performing together, supporting one another along the way.

I also reflected briefly on something that happened about 30 years ago, when the national curriculum was introduced into our schools. One school I was associated with had a new head teacher, who took the decision to scrap the end of year production in favour of a greater focus on the content of the curriculum. I wonder what the year 6 children back then missed out on? Not just the lack of a fantastic special memory of their time in primary school, but also the opportunity to learn through experience what it means to work together to produce something that brings pleasure and inspiration to others; the opportunity to learn what it means to push yourself to new limits; the opportunity to experience a deeper level of trust and camaraderie. So many missed opportunities to discover more about themselves and what it means to live and work together with others.

Thankfully, our year 6 children will carry with them the lessons learned and the wonderful memories gained from performing in Bugsy Malone. The end of term also saw our year 6 pupils achieving a truly excellent set of SATS results. This, as well as the school production, is testament not only to the children's resilience and hard work, but also the tremendous professionalism and dedication of the staff at St Michael's school.

Academic excellence is something to value and each set of exams passed will open the door to a new stage on the journey of life. But the opportunity to get together for a school production will open the door to so much more in terms of personal development. And when those lifelong friends get together 20 or 40 years from now, it will surely be Bugsy Malone that they remember with fondness, not the results of an exam!

Vision Day

On Saturday 2nd July 11 of us from St Michael's gathered at St Cuthbert's Fulwood to reflect on our life together as a Church, most ably guided by Rev. Steve Haskett, Parish Renewal Lead for the diocese.

We began with an exercise in word association – asking what we think of when we hear the name 'St Michael's, Grimsargh,' giving a positive image of a church community which is welcoming, friendly, inclusive, compassionate and broadly enthusiastic. We also recognised that we have a historic and attractive building and offer a 'mixed diet' of services which gives us greater flexibility in appealing to the wider community.

All of this gave us a good starting point to consider our strengths as a parish as well as our areas of weakness (or limitations). We were able to recognise a range of strengths, including our active Mothers' Union branch, our strong links with St Michael's school and the excellent musician we have in Ben, all of which I described as particular blessings when speaking about this in a recent sermon.

Some of the things that hold us back we identified as (i) lack of engagement with children, young people and families (which is being addressed in our intention to restart Jigsaw Club (Sunday School) in September – details to be shared in the near future); (ii) the restrictions of a traditional building with limited flexible space and no proper meeting room, and (iii) insufficient opportunities for people to grow as disciples through study and prayer.

We went on to consider the opportunities that lie before us, as well as some of the threats to our desire to grow as a church community: unsurprisingly, the latter included financial concerns and the consequences and ongoing effects of Covid.

The day aimed to leave us with a set of possible objectives on which we could focus to help strengthen the life of St Michael's Church. These included:

- How we use our physical resources (buildings and land)
- Investing time and resources in ministry to children, young people and families
- Enhancing the way we communicate with the wider community
- Investing in activities to encourage discipleship and nurture spiritual growth

Work has already begun in some of these areas and PCC will meet with Steve Haskett again on 5th September to consider the way forward.

Thank you to all who were able to take part in the vision day, and for the many ways in which *everyone* contributes to making St Michael's the welcoming place it is. Please consider prayerfully if God might wish to work through you in new ways, to ensure there is a long and healthy future for St Michael's and the work of Christ can flourish in our community.

Melanesia

Many of you will know Rev John Ball, who has taken many services here at St Michael's in recent years. Many will also know about his skill in creating stained glass work, such as nativity sets, crosses and bespoke commissions of windows and glass panels. John uses this gift to support the work of the Melanesian Brothers — a religious order engaged in mission and ministry predominantly around the Solomon Islands and Papua New Guinea. Here John writes about the Brotherhood and his connection with it. He will be with us on 11th September to preach at the 10am service and I hope we will be able to offer our support to the Melanesian Brothers through John (this is one way we can maintain our charitable / missionary giving now that the blue envelope scheme has ended).

In 1841 John Coleridge Patteson at the age of 14 heard the Bishop of New Zealand, George Selwyn, preach at Eton College. He was so moved by the sermon on the Bishop's ministry in New Zealand and Melanesia that after studying at Oxford he was ordained to serve in a village parish in Devon. After this he sailed with Bishop Selwyn to work in New Zealand where his first ministry was among Maori people.

Selwyn took Patteson to the islands of Melanesia and Patteson continued his ministry there. He had a gift for languages and soon mastered many of the tribal languages. In time it was realised that Melanesia needed to be a diocese on its own for the work of the church to grow. Patteson was the obvious person to be its first

bishop. Much could be written about this work, but he was killed by some islanders in the Santa Cruz islands in 1871.

I want to jump forward to 1925 when a native policeman called Ini Kopuria had a vision of Jesus calling him to do different work for the people. He founded the Melanesian Brotherhood and he dedicated his life to evangelism taking the gospel to villages in the islands. He recruited men to join him in this ministry. The men were asked to make only a five year commitment to service. Many joined him and some stayed for much longer. Ini died in 1945 but the Brotherhood has grown to be one of the largest religious orders in the Anglican Communion.



I first met two of the Brothers when they came to the Diocese of Chester in 1992. Chester had a link with Christchurch New Zealand and Melanesia and I was subsequently appointed to be the link officer. I went out to Solomon Islands (which is part of Melanesia) in 1994 and I spent some time with the Brothers and also with the Franciscans, the Community of the Sisters of the Church, and the Community of the Sisters of Melanesia (the latter are the female equivalent of the Brothers).

The Brothers receive **no** pay for their work. They are a poor order but what they lack in comforts and luxury they more than make up for by the strength and commitment of their faith. They live in very spartan conditions. I was now fully committed to the Brothers. In 1995 I was asked to lead the appeal in the Chester Diocese to raise £70,000 to provide a new base for the Brothers in the capital Honiara to expand their work. To cut a long story short we managed to raise £77,000 for the new building to be known as Chester Rest House.

When the building was completed in 1997 I was invited to travel to Honiara to open and, with the Bishop, to bless Chester House and to share the life of the Brotherhood at their headquarters outside Honiara. It was a wonderful privilege to return there and I will never forget the experience. I have a rich collection of memories and often allude to them in my sermons. While there I was admitted as a Companion of the Brotherhood and I wear my medal with pride (the right sort!) I am delighted to do my stained glass work to support the Brothers.

It's all Greek to me! (cont)

To set the context for the classic period of Greek literature c 500 to 350 BC, we must advert to 3 heroic battles which set up in Greece a period when the area was free from outside interference. The first of these was at Marathon 490 BC, when the Persian invaders under Darius was repulsed at the famous battle site 26+ miles from Athens, whither the runner ran non-stop to convey news of the victory, and according to legend, died. The third was the naval battle of Salamis 10 years later in 480 BC when Xerxes, son of Darius, tried his luck at invasion but was there decisively defeated in the narrow seas between the isle of Euboea and the mainland where the Persian superiority in number of ships was counteracted by the Athenian strategists and by the greater manoeuvrability of their ships.

But the 2nd battle at Thermopylae which preceded Salamis, is the most heroic of all. The site was then in the 4th century BC a narrow pass between the mountains and the sea (today an undistinguished scrub land area, as the sea has retreated). There King Leonidas and the 300 Spartan heavy armoured soldiers ("Hoplites") made a last stand against the Persian hordes, and with some allied soldiers, were annihilated. Leonidas knew that he and his men were setting out on a suicide

mission. If you knew you were going on such a mission, and could choose who to take with you, would you choose men who were unmarried and without children, or married men with families? Leonidas chose only men with sons, which incidentally included himself, so that after his unit's sacrifice, the sons could carry on the Spartan race and tradition. Famously there was said to be a memorial in ancient times at the battle site which read, Stranger, go tell the Spartans that here we lie, obedient to their will. The word for stranger is "Xeinos"; from which is derived the English word Xenophobia. And the Persian wars give us an introduction into the first of the great Greek tragedian playwrights, Aeschylus who wrote the play "the Persians".

Our next meeting is on 21st September when we welcome everyone back together with a service in church. No meeting is held in August.


For the children of Michael's, Grimsargh.

All you need is a holder (a plate, jam jar lid or plant pot saucer would all work well) some string and some food!
