The view from the study.

Do you ever wonder what it would be like to live through an historic era? Imagine being up on Hadrian's Wall 1900 years ago when it was new and imposing, and all things Roman were becoming the norm in society. Or what about witnessing the march of the Norman conquest post 1066, when the landscape was changing as William constructed his imposing castles and our great historic cathedrals were appearing? It is hard to believe that I turn 58 in June and have never lived in the reign of another monarch. There have been plenty of Prime Ministers over the years, but only one Queen! We are all, as some commentators put it, 'New Elizabethans'. Surely having reigned for 70 years entitles the Queen to have an historical era named after her and we are all part of this significant piece of history. What a blessing and a privilege to be here.

It is not just the length of time that makes the current Jubilee so remarkable, but the level of dedication shown by the Queen throughout her long reign. In 1947, on her 21st birthday, the young Princess Elizabeth stated: *I declare before you all that my whole life whether it be long or short shall be devoted to your service and the service of our great imperial family to which we all belong.*

The end of that sentence demonstrates how things have changed over the course of the last century! But the sentiment remains the same and the Queen has never wavered from the promise she made then and reaffirmed more recently.

Whatever our sympathies towards the institution of the Monarchy, may we all reflect warmly on the wonderful example of service and faith shown by Her Majesty, and share in the loyal Lancastrian toast to 'The Queen, Duke of Lancaster'. Long may she reign, and long may we follow her shining example.

It's all Greek to me! (cont)

Who was Homer? The prosaic answer is that there was no such person; that the name is as mythic as the Iliad heroes, and merely represents a collective of strolling minstrels, who gathered together a number of folk tales and recited them to an eager public, which were then set down in writing when that form of communication first reached Greece around 700 BC, some 400 years after the fall of Troy, traditionally said to be 1184 BC. If you can imagine a world where not only could you as an ordinary person not be able to read, as for the vast majority of people before or even well into the 20th century, but a world where there is no writing at all other than a few customary symbols. So that everything you ever heard or learned had to come to you by the spoken word. No wonder that it is thought the wandering poets were popular, high status figures. Their arrival in your village must have been like the first showing of the latest Bond film; you would avidly absorb the familiar, old heroic tales, but possibly spiced up with some recent additions of your poet's own creation, for both the Iliad, a tale of warriors and exploits in battle, and the Odyssey, a tale of travel adventures in exotic locations, are tailor made for additions, and their final forms reveal them as a rag bag of folk tales and diversions. The poets must have seemed like a breath of fresh air after all those boring stories from your elders about how good things were in the old days, how things recently had gone to the dogs; soap opera with a twist, a combination of the well known with exciting, new accretions.

However, the more romantic view, and sustainable by scholarship, is that there was indeed a man called Homer. First, scholars see some constant, core themes in both epics, indicating a unity of concept. He is traditionally said to have gone blind, because the Odyssey especially is laced with words referring to sound (though both epics contain vivid pictorial description as well), one example of a word sounding like its meaning being the Greek word "polyphloisbos", literal meaning, of the sea, "of many sounds", it being theorised that this is what the poet heard, when he became blind in old age, an additional theory being that the Iliad was the work of young Homer, and the Odyssey his work when old and blind.

SCHOOL REPORT

Our Christian Value for this half-term is **TRUTHFULNESS.** We have enjoyed exploring this value and challenging the thoughts of our children. We posed and explored responses to questions such as:

- Have you ever been tempted to tell a lie to get something you want? How did it make you feel inside?
- Do you tell the whole truth?
- Which is the best way of describing the truth?

- If you found a ten-pound note on the floor in a supermarket, would you keep it for yourself or hand it in to a member of staff?
- A boy turned twelve two days after his football team asked for players for the under elevens team. Should he volunteer for the team or allow his eleven-year-old friends the opportunity to play?
- Have you ever been tempted to make the wrong choice?

We also celebrated St George's day by wearing white/ red to school. During worship, a group of children acted out a short sketch showing when St George fought the dragon. We discussed that we may not be physically brave like St George, but that we can all be truthful, by not always following the crowd when we know that something is wrong, or by doing things that make the world a better place. Even if our deeds cannot be seen, we know in our hearts, what is the right thing to do.

We were delighted to find out and announce that we have officially been awarded with the Picture News Advocate logo. Our themes for worship are based on Christian values and alongside this, we observe the Church's year and therefore some acts of worship stand alone. In order for our children to have time to reflect on current national and international events, we use Picture News once a week. This invaluable resource provides our teachers with excellent resources to lead high quality worship, that incorporates real life examples of Christian values, reference to stories from the Old and the New Testament and prayers.

We are thankful to our PTFA for organising our new pre-loved uniform shop! The donation point is now in place at school, allowing parents/ carers to donate good-quality items of uniform for re-use all year round. This is in part a fund-raising initiative for the school, but it is also an opportunity to recycle and reuse, reducing our impact on the environment. To buy an item of pre-loved uniform, parents can message the PTFA Facebook page (@PTFAGrimsargh) with what they need, and our PTFA check for availability. Arrangements are then made for collection with payments made via ParentPay.

We were really pleased to have our new library wall graphics installed- they finish of our libraries perfectly.

We have continued to enter all sporting competitions and have had over 80 different children represent our school so far this year. We also continue to be in 1st place in the league table of point scoring competitions- we are extremely proud of our children for their sporting achievements.
