Mrs Hurley was recently appointed as the Town Council representative and was welcomed to her first meeting with us on September 19th. Cllr Brian Mead, well versed in museum matters in recent years had, pending Mrs Hurley's appointment, been filling both Town and District roles.

PROFILE - SHIRLEY MILLIDGE

Shirley is a comparative newcomer to our museum scene and comes with an interesting portfolio of qualifications, all of which should prove to be of value in her dealings with associations such as our own. She is married, has two children, and lives in Tollesbury.

From 1980 to '84 Shirley was at Edinburgh University where she gained an M.A. with Honours in Fine Art and Conservation Studies; from 1984 to '86 she was at Gateshead as a Post-Graduate in Conservation and Restoration of Works of Art on Paper, with Museum and Business Studies.

1986 found her at the University of Ontario in Ottawa, Canada, as a summer intern studying Photographic Conservation, followed by a couple of years in private employ. In 1989 Shirley was in Copenhagen at an International Conference plus summer school on Historic Photographs and Conservation, after which she became a freelance author for MacMillan Publishers.

All of which appears to have stood her in good stead for her present occupation, for in July of this year she joined the Maldon District Council (Mr.Lynn's team) as Development Officer for Museums and the Arts, available for advice on matters on which she is obviously well qualified to speak.

The 'Big Move' was of course the inevitable conclusion of our relatively short stay of three years in 'Spindles', the period being determined by the availability of the next year's rent. An eventful three years which would unboubtedly have been more relaxed had we been assured either of the rent or a secure stable home such as we are now promised in the Promenade Lodge.

For quite a long time we were hopeful of occupying the old Library (in St. Peter's under the Flume Library) which we could have comfortably filled with all the items we have available for display, not all to everybody's taste of course but certainly something for everybody. In the event and at the time of writing the old Library looks like becoming a pawn in the Heritage Centre deliberations and if eventually it becomes a display centre we shall be pleased to contribute from time to time if so requested.

We began our move quietly on the 25th August with a member, his brother and modest hatchback. On the 26th we were still open to the Public most of whom seemed to be aware of the impending move and showed interest in the future. On Sunday 27th at one time there were nine of us busy packing, marking, and conveying to our store. How useful were those who already had knowledge of the handling of (eg) ancient pottery; their experience and assistance was invaluable. On the 28th at one time we had five, and again on the 29th and by then almost all the tedious work was done, and even the birds in their cases were largely cleared by midday Mednesday. On Thursday we relaxed and on Friday the larger and heavier display cases and exhibits were in the main cleared thanks to the assistance of the District Council, whilst five or so members cleared the bulkier books and drawers of papers. Some were left over to the Monday with the blessing of our landlady, and probably a sigh of relief that it was all achieved without damage to the building.

Somewhere in the middle of all this Chairman Terry wheeled the pennyfarthing 'cycle through the town to the store and swears he didn't actually ride it. We had considered the possibility of putting the stuffed crocodile on wheels behind him but it might have been misconstrued as being about to attack him from the rear.

As with almost all such 'best laid plans...' well, Monday came and went and so did several more days due to transport problems, but eventually the last me breathed our exhausted farewells to 'Spindles'.

BILL CHITTENDEN - ANOTHER FRIEND OF THE MUSEUM

It is to be most sincerely hoped that this, the second obituary in two consecutive news letters is not continued into a third, as the Association can ill afford to lose long-standing members like Bill Chittenden, of whose sad death the majority will already be aware.

Bill was born and bred in Folkestone, and was evacuated for the war years to South Wales, returning to Kent at the age of sixteen. He gained experience in the power industry for several years all over the country, then came from Kent to the early days of Bradwell Power Station where in 1959 he met Secretary Betty Askew. They were married a year later and lived in Maldon.

In 1971 Bill and Betty visited the reopened Museum and bought tickets in a raffle for engraved tumblers, which they won. The engraving commemorated the BOOth Charter Anniversary, and was the year Gueen Elizabeth II came to Maldon. The win prompted the Chittendens to join the Museum Association and they have been members ever since, but meanwhile they had moved to Latchingdon where both of them were closely yet quietly involved with several charitable organisations, both preferring to avoid the spotlight, although Bill was in fact Church Warden at Latchingdon Church for about nine years.

He was quite proud of his association with the Dengie Activity Group for whom he drove for about ten years, and was still driving for the group when he became ill.

Locally, Bill also enjoyed his long association with The Maldon Society, being Membership Secretary for four years; a Charter Member of Maldon Lions with whom in his fifteen years he filled most official posts; and more recently he became a member of the Maldon Archaeological Group. He usually supported Betty when she acted as Steward in the Museum.

About twelve months ago Bill and Betty did what they had always planned to do, and moved back into Maldon, little realising what was in store. Three months later Bill was suddenly taken ill, and the events of the ensuing weeks are already well known to his old friends and acquaintances. He passed away on the 2nd September 1995; we were represented at All Saints' Church on the 8th.

CONSTITUTION MATTERS

In Issue 3 of the 'Penny-Farthing' we presented in all detail the amended constitution as sent to the Charity Commissioners for their approval. There is little point in reporting their reply verbatim as the following amendments are in line with that reply....

SO....PLEASE REFER TO YOUR COPY OF 'PENNY-FARTHING' No.3 AND AMEND YOUR COPY OF THE CONSTITUTION AS SUBMITTED, TO READ AS FOLLOWS. NOTE THAT ANY ALTERATIONS OR ADDITIONS ARE IN BOLD TYPE.-

2. Object:

The object of the Association, a Charitable Trust registered with the Charity Commissioners as Charity number 301362, shall be to advance the education of the public by the provision of a museum.

11. Expenses:

Any member may reclaim reasonable out-of-pocket expenses at the discretion of the Committee of the Association.

18. Alterations to the Constitution:

Subject to the following provisions of this clause the Constitution may be altered by a resolution passed by not less than two thirds of the members present and voting at a general meeting provided that the motion to do so is carried by at least half the paid-up membership, whichever is the smaller. The notice of the general meeting must include notice of the resolution, setting out the terms of the alteration proposed.

- 18a.No amendment may be made to clause 1; clause 2; clause 10; clause 14; or this clause without the prior consent in writing of the Commissioners.
- 18b.No amendment may be made which would have the effect of making the Charity cease to be a charity at law.
- 18c. The Executive Committee should promptly send to the Commissioners a copy of any amendment made under this clause.

COPIES OF THE FULL 'APPROVED' UPDATED CONSTITUTION WILL BE AVAILABLE ON REQUEST AT THE A.S.M., OR EARLIER IF REQUIRED.

REGISTRATION

In Issue No.1 of 'The Penny-Farthing' we outlined the benefits of becoming a Registered museum under the auspices of 'The Museums & Galleries Commission' ('MGC') and interested members may feel it time that we reported on the latest situation in our efforts to become registered.

We studied, learned, considered, discussed, produced, discussed, amended, corresponded, presented, and finally...bingo!...our proposed Acquisition and Disposal Policy was approved by the South Eastern Museums Service (SEMS for short) who preview such items for the MSC. It is dated as from 1st January 1996 for a period of five years which takes us to the 31st December 2000, but a review of it will be considered in the light of practical experience once we have resettled in the Lodge; and on reflection that could take a year or two.

Next requirement is the formal appointment of a Curatorial Advisor. Mr Arthur Wright has for many years been respected and highly regarded as just that, but there appears to be nothing documented even though there probably is, so we wrote to him and his reply will be reported elsewhere.

Equally important is the required Documentation Plan which states what we are going to do, how, and by when. This is being seriously pursued following the 'Documentation for Registration' session on 31st October, a tutorial taken by Kevin Gosling of SEMS who instructs full-time on such matters throughout the Eastern Area. We were well represented including five committee members (see elsewhere for report).

The Acquisition Register follows closely in the wake of the Documentation Plan and here we are hopefully prepared for whatever may come. During the move from 'Spindles' we separated all the accessions records which came to hand. There are some excellent card records, reasonably up-to-date in many respects, with older registers which when taken together give a fairly comprehensive record of stocks, about five hundred items already having been individually renumbered and (presumably) re-labelled. However, all available (ie.traced) records have been 'computerised' with all available reference numbers, so we now have the basis of a system from which an approved Register can be compiled. The computerised records can be grouped into eighteen selections.

It is not suggested at this stage that the computer record is 100% accurate as there are several known instances of items being in store which have not been found on paper, and vice versa. A 100% physical stock check could no doubt resolve those problems, if it were ever possible to find enough willing hands to carry it out. (cont'd)...

At this point in time we have about five hundred recorded items known to exist but not renumbered, whilst a very large number of pre-war artefacts, not found in store when C.B. revived the museum, have deliberately been omitted from our latest record. Remember, the Museum was in store for about thirty years from early war days until C.B. dared to sort it out again, but if anyone knows the whereabouts of (e.g.) 1914/18 War memorabilia including a German Machine Gun, Shrapnel Helmet, Cartridges, Grenades, Bayonets, and such items we would be most interested. Nor do we expect to find the 'Sovereign Scales' with weights, recorded in 1923, nor the next entry 'Jeweller's Scales' with scruple weights....and etc. Who knows...?

Relabelling is another requirement which will of necessity be carried out when we are able to sort and regroup. Altogether much work to be done, but much of it interesting, and satisfying once completed. Volunteers?.

When we can show that all this is at least in hand, then we can with some justification apply for the next stage of Registration.

ARTEFACTS OFFICER

Kath Buckley is hopeful of finding work outside the area and feels that she should no longer carry this title, which may call for more free time than what is available to her. Kath therefore resigned the post at the committee meeting on November 21st but continues as a member of the committee and will assist her successor in any way she can. Thank you anyway, Kath!

Penny Cook's name was mentioned as a possible successor, and met with general approval but Penny was 'on sick leave'. A telephone call to her the following day was met with a cheerful and positive response so, subject to confirmation at the next committee meeting, Penny is the new Artefacts Officer who will be able to call on most of us for backing when required, and if we are lucky, husband Ken won't be too far away either.

"Oh Yes I will" she said muddling along: I knew I could be of no help. lapatient of watching her, Robert finally got down on his hands and knees... "Here, give me those clippers", and he started trimming, stopping only when the job was done. "See..!" said the neighbour,"...told you I'd get it done sitting in this chair".

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BASIC MUSEUM DOCUMENTATION

It might easily have been made boring by some speakers, but Kevin Gosling, Regional Outreach Manager for the East, who is very experienced in such matters made the whole session quite interesting, occasionally amusing, and most of us left the Essex Libraries HQ in Chelmsford feeling more confident than when we arrived; which, on reflection, was what it was all about.

To enlarge a little on that, six of us - Terry Chapman, Penny and Ken Cook, Kath Buckley, Tony Froom and Len Barrell joined about eight others on Tues 31st Oct at 1.30 pm. We would have been joined by Shirley Millidge (MDC) but she was unfortunately out of action for a few days, whilst others found the timing to be most difficult.

However, without more ado, we covered:—
The importance of sensible documentation —and most it is common—sense, particularly to anyone who has even limited experience of book—keeping. The Museum and Galleries Commission Registration Scheme and 'Spectrum', (the UK Museum Documentation Standard).
Entry Records — ie. recording items received.
Accession Records and data security — ie. stock records and copies.
Labelling & Marking — viz. safely without damage.
Indexing, for speedy reference.
Movement Records —ie. where it should be and where it's gone to.
Exit Records —ie. what we did with an item sold, destroyed, donated etc.
Loan Records —viz. received for and lent for display.
Tackling backlogs — How to do what we have already started...
(SEE SEPARATE ARTICLE ON 'REGISTRATION')

We left Chelmsford to go our own ways about 5.00 p.m.

'ONE OF OUR PENNY-FARTHINGS IS MISSING!'

Tony and Judy Tullett attended a one day training course on 'Caring for your Collections' organised by Museums in Essex. The Course was held on Saturday 18th November 1995 at the Burnham-On-Crouch Museum and was presented by Deborah Boden. Other delegates at the course included -

Henry Potten, Curator of the Burnham Museum, which mainly specialises in social history, and archaeology.

Mr & Mrs Neaver from Saffron Walden Museum, including the Fry Art Gallery, with a framed collection from the Bardfield School of Artists and a collection formed from Bawden's work - mainly prints and watercolours.

Mrs Margaret Stone from Brightlingsea Museum; this museum specialising in local maritime and people, and housing the Wakeling collection.

The morning was spent investigating the cause of damage from high humidity and light. We were shown how to colate Relative Humidity with various pieces of equipment including a Whirling Hygrometer, and were instructed in their use. Ideally artefacts of all types should be displayed and stored in areas where Relative Humidity is controlled.

Light levels came next, with information on materials which were either sensitive or non-sensitive to light. Ceramics, glass, stone and metal are all examples of non-sensitive materials. It seems that darkness is the secret for keeping artefacts in good condition, with tungsten lighting being the least damaging form of illumination. There are of course various devices for measuring light strength and also the amount of ultra-violet light which objects may be absorbing.

The afternoon session of the course centred on how to clean exhibits and keep them in good condition, without risking too much damage when moving, packing or storing items. An interesting video from the National Trust was shown in relation to these subjects.

In conclusion, we realised the extent to which museums have now moved on in the care and conservation department and how much we need to catch up in this area. Certainly a worthwhile exercise, especially as we are in the process of setting up a new museum, and hopefully some of the information gained from attending this course may be put into practice in the relocation of the Maldon District Museum.

The usual formalities and routine matters were of little interest, then we came to 'Acquisitions' - most meetings seemed to record donations under this heading - December 10th revealed a truly mixed bag......

- b) Fragment of a pot (?)Romano-Celtic from the North Doubles.

- c) 11 Fragments of pottery found in a trench at Goldhanger,
 -- presented by Cllr Furlong --
- d) A Turkish hand grenade, Bean and Pod from Portugese E. Africa.
- e) A Turkish stiletto, and piece of rope from a mystery ship
 - presented by Mr George Davis, 62, Spital Road --
- A Tooth from a female skeleton found in a sarcophagus under the floor of the Chapter House at Beeleigh Abbey.
 - -- lent by Miss Dedman --
- g) 3 Rosettes, made for and worn at the Wedding festivities of the late Queen Alexandra March 10th 1863.

-- presented by Miss Gower --

Several of these items are still to be found in the museum, albeit with difficulty at this time when many artefacts are wrapped and/or boxed for storage, to be displayed again when the Prom Lodge can be occupied.
